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REPORT ON OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

2021-22

1. Community Service at Navjeevan Center- Nerul

PCER Panvel, B.Ed. students took up community work at Navjeevan Center, Nerul as a part of their curriculum. Students of NIOS, NEET and D.Ed. were taught one to one and in small groups preparing them for their potential success and growth. The outreach was much appreciated by the NJC students and staff. 20 students took classes in two sessions morning and afternoon for NIOS and Nursing entrance exam. All of them had a common goal of assisting and teaching the students to achieve success.



The students there were punctual responsive ready to learn and most of all very grateful and eagerly waited for the teachers to come which kept each one motivated. It improved their ability to understand complexity and ambiguity. It helped their interpersonal development, particularly the ability to work well with others, and build leadership qualities and communication skills. Overall, it enhanced the sense of personal efficacy, personal identity, spiritual growth, and moral development. The students who rendered selfless service at NJC were much appreciated by the cooperative staff and our principal.



2. Literacy Drive at Jeevan Jyoti Charitable Trust-Panvel



The student teachers got an opportunity to go and serve the society in the best possible way. Teaching included English alphabets and phonics, numbers, addition, subtraction, about community helpers and how to maintain discipline and cleanliness in our place and surrounding. Student teachers also inculcated basic exercise, rhymes, stories and so many activities with help of props, which made easy for them to understand.



3. Tutoring at Nirmal Jeevan Charitable Trust-Kamothe.

Nirmal Jeevan Charitable Trust is a Non-Profitable Organization on a mission to empower individuals and community to live with Dignity. The Trust was registered under Bombay Public Trust in 1950. The students visited the center along with the mentor Dr Jiji Sahaya. They were arranged into 4 groups each with one group consisting of 4-5 members. Each group was supposed to visit two days per week to teach the children there. The time frame given was 2 hours and worked hard to bring difference in child life in whatever way possible through our involvement. They kept records of the portion taught and discussed them. There were four

standards Nursery, junior, senior and second. Each week students visited to teach and conduct various activities for the children, each group would teach in the first hour and start with various informative and fun activities in the second hour. All in all, it was an eye-opening journey for all.



4. Mentoring at kal ki Chaya- Kalamboli

B.Ed students from the institution undertook a transformative outreach activity at Kal Ki Chhaya, Kalamboli, embodying the spirit of mentoring and community engagement. 6. Paper-bag making

8. E-waste collection Drive:

Plastic waste is an issue which is still prevalent on our planet however due to increase in technology, the next hurdle faced by humankind is increasing e-waste. Proper disposal of e-waste is a burning concern therefore the Nature club decided to collaborate with Thane Mahanagar Palika's Swacchh Sarvekshan 2022 for creating awareness among the student teachers about e-waste and its proper disposal.

Students & teachers collected e-waste from their family and relatives and submitted it to the college. The college in turn donated e-waste to the organization for its eco-friendly method of disposal.



9. Managing Plastic Waste – Making Ecobricks:

Plastic is an amazing material with incredible properties, however when it goes to 'waste', it contaminates the ecosystems that sustain us and our fellow species. Eco bricks enable plastic to be secured out of industry and the biosphere. To make good use of plastic waste, PCERP students made eco bricks & packed all non-recyclable waste into a single-use plastic/ PET bottle. The collected bottles will then be used in making furniture.

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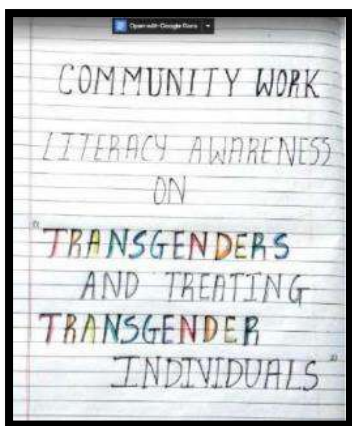

2. Personal Hygiene Awareness Campaign

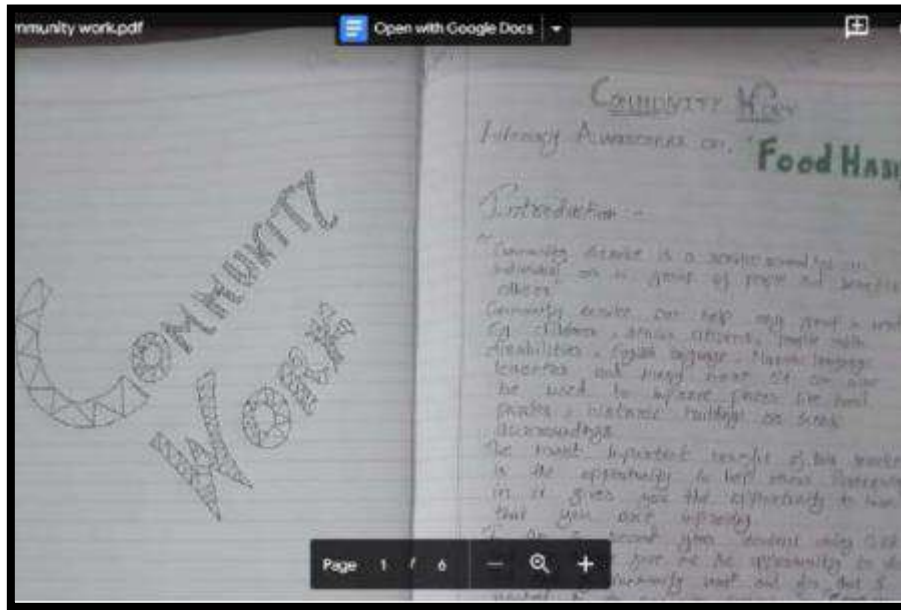

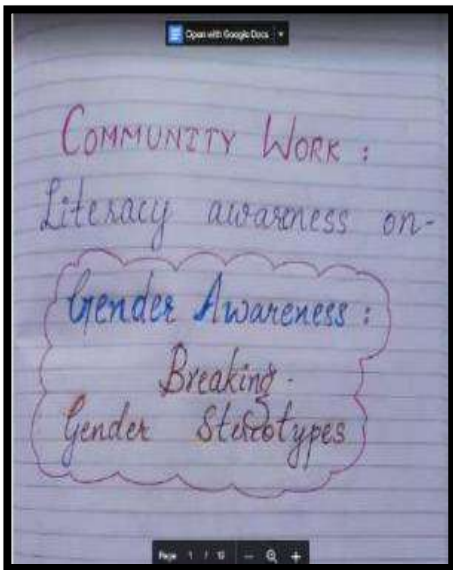
3. Promoting Literacy Awareness on Healthy Food Habits

This initiative aimed to educate individuals about the importance of making informed dietary choices and adopting healthy eating habits to improve overall well-being.



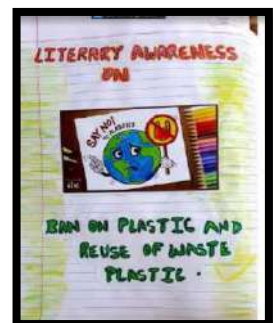
4. Shattering Stereotypes: Gender Consciousness


essential to continue advocating for plastic bans, promoting plastic reuse initiatives, and engaging with the community to foster a culture of environmental stewardship and collective action.

Volunteers of the Gurudwara provided food for 5000 people daily and risked their lives to make sure that the poor people of Panvel & Navi Mumbai don't suffer from starvation during this crisis. They distributed food across 12 different locations in Panvel & Navi Mumbai and we were proud to have Pillai Alumni and faculty supporting them as well. The Gurudwara requires 300kg of rice, 150 kg of dal and another 150 kg of atta every day to feed the needy. All our students, faculty and well-wishers were encouraged to contribute as much as possible as all the proceeds were collected & donated to the Gurudwara so that they could keep the food drive going for as long as needed.

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REPORT ON OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

2019-20

1. Community work: Bhartiya Manav Vikas Trust's Special School, New Panvel



We had our community service initiative at Manav Vikas Sanstha, a school for special children at New Panvel. This school has students with mild to moderate to severe disability that are taken care of by a wonder team of well-trained and sensitive teachers

led by their Principal, Ms. Shreya Jadhav. Each batch of our student teachers spent two hours every day with the children and their teachers in understanding the needs of the students and ways to help them. Our student teachers also prepared teaching aids for the center as per the instructions of the teachers. The objective of taking our student to this school was to make them sensitive to the society we live in; the people who are part of the society and also make them realize the amount of patience and sensitivity required by the teachers to handle special children.



2. Community work: Rotary Club of Panvel Industrial Town Charitable Trust's Rotary Special School for Hearing Impaired Children at New Panvel

Our student teachers and teachers attended the school in small batches and assisted the teachers in their daily activities of teaching learning and other cocurricular activities for nearly two hours daily. We were at this center for a month. Our students were sensitized to need for early

testing of children to understand impairment and the course of action to be taken after diagnosis. It was understood that early diagnosis leads to almost recovery and near normal speech and hearing. Our students also learnt some basic sign language to communicate with them. They came back with a sense of satisfaction and a new appreciation for life as we know it.



3. Shramdaan: At Shantivan, Nere, Panvel

This year one of our community service initiative has been with Shantivan, Nere, Panvel which is primarily a center for Leprosy eradication and rehabilitation. This center also has an old age home, a naturopathy clinic, home for dependents, a school for Adivasi children and many more aspects. Our students and teachers had a three-day visit to Shantivan to clean up the place after the rainy season. Our students are involved in Shramdaan“, which actually involves hard labour. We pulled weeds and overgrown grass from different sections of the center as per the instructions of the staff. This was also a preparation for Diwali. Our students and teachers completed all the work as given. They also spent time at the old age home with the senior citizens and were moved by the tales they heard from them. This also sensitized them to the need to look after our parents in their time of need.



4. Creating Awareness on Noise pollution:

On November 30th, 2019, the college arranged a silent march in Khanda Colony with the aim of raising awareness about noise pollution. The students carried placards bearing messages about the prevention of noise pollution and its negative impact on the mental well-being of the community.



5. Celebration of Community Service Day by Mahatma Education Society: Immanuel Mercy Home



As Mahatma Education Society celebrates its 50th year, our Community day on 24th January, 2020 had a slight difference. This year, we were asked to invite our alumni to participate as volunteers for the day. As in the past year, this year also we had children from Immanuel Mercy Ashram, Chiple, Panvel as the NGO we connected with. For community day, we obtained permission to take children to V Pillai Campus and on the day of the event, 20 children from the ashram were brought to the campus. After a wonderful lunch, we took the children to the designated room where we had organized games for them. Our alumni immediately took over the activities and games and involved all the children. Most of the games were group games but we

also played H11sic. The children had a wonderful time participating in these games and everyone went home with prizes. The prizes chosen this year were of utility value depending on the age of the students. After receiving snacks and gifts sponsored by Mahatma Education Society, the children were dropped off at Immanuel Mercy Ashram.

6. Exploring Career Paths Beyond Teaching in Education



The talk on "Career Options in Education Beyond Teaching" by Ms. Shaily Shah served as a valuable outreach activity, providing students with valuable insights and inspiration to pursue diverse career paths within the education sector. By sharing her experiences and expertise, Ms. Shah not only expanded students' horizons but also instilled a

sense of enthusiasm and purpose in their academic and professional endeavors. Moving forward, it is imperative to continue organizing such enlightening sessions to empower students and foster their personal and professional growth.

7. Plastic Recycling Initiative

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REPORT ON OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

2017-18

1. Community Service- Teaching the slum children near Panvel Railway Station

Jeevan Jyothi Trust, Panvel MES' Pillai College of Education and Research, New Panvel has always been deeply committed to community work. One of the activity we are involved in is teaching. This year along with Jeevan Jyothi Trust, Panvel our community work was with the children from economically weaker sections residing around Mall Takka area. This is located very close to Panvel railway station and NMMT bus depot. There are close to 40 children who assemble in a room provided by a local community leader. Nearly 25-30 of these children go to regular schools nearby. The remaining children are non-school going and range in age from 4 to 8 years. Students were divided on the basis of their place of stay and students were sent in groups of 5-6 every day from Monday to Saturday from October 25th, 2017. Each student was assigned a small group of students and they acted as mentors. One teacher in-charge also accompanied the students. We worked with the school going children by clearing their concepts, helping to revise their subjects, learning English and also helped them with scholarship topics. Our students really enjoyed the interactions and were elated to see the difference they were making by helping these children.

Student teachers at PCER, made paper bags out of old magazines or old newspapers. These vendors use these bags for selling sprouts, masala and other items like dried fish. At the moment, we have focussed only on few vendors but we plan to widen the area of this activity. The bags are sent to the vendors on a regular basis and students are asked to interact with them to find out their specific needs, if any. This initiative has been well received so far and we plan to continue with it. Both our first- and second-year students are involved in this community work.



4. Jumble Sale: Soroptimist International Bombay Chembur
